Treasurer – Terri Capshaw

I provided a balance sheet and Profit & Loss through September. It reflects dues through July and what little expense we had this year. Our cash balance has continued to grow, up \$8834 so far, mainly because we didn't have many opportunities to put our dues to work. There is going to be a motion later to write off some equipment. The PA system and accounting software are the only assets that will remain. The liabilities are the bonds that we are holding for the next two conventions. Dues are showing 90% of budget, which is good. We're way under our travel budget, since there hasn't been travel other than the AANR mid-winter meeting in February. We've only had one bill for the NudeScene. We sent our AANR-NW library support to the Willamettans, and did have some beach cleanup expenses. Donations are to the ANRL library, \$750 to the AANR Education Foundation, \$250 as budgeted and \$500 in memory of Bob Watzel, \$75 to SOLVE and \$1000 to the Lahey family to help support their granddaughter's medical needs. We renewed our corporate license and insurance. As voted, we sent the host club convention reimbursement to support Sun Meadow, despite canceling the convention due to the COVID pandemic. We did still have regional awards and scholarship expenses. We had a net income so far of \$6600, and our budget expected that to be a little less. It's common for non-profits to budget a little in the red, because if money from past years isn't spent, since we want to use our funds, and also because we rarely spend everything we budget, because some are contingencies and some doesn't happen.

Rules of Business for On-Line Meetings for the AANR-NW Region

“Where there is radical difference of opinion in an organization, one side must yield. The great lesson for democracies to learn is for the majority to give the minority a full, free opportunity to present their side of the case, and then for the minority, having failed to win a majority to their views, gracefully to submit and to recognize the action as that of the entire organization, and cheerfully to assist in carrying it out, until they can secure its repeal.”

Henry Robert, *Parliamentary Law*

The business meeting will be recorded. This meeting is being run by video conference, due to the COVID-19 pandemic. These rules are slightly modified to accommodate this format.

MOTION PROCEDURES:

Motions are to be written and e-mailed to the president and to the secretary, and the secretary will transcribe the motion to an AANR-NW Motion Form. One person needs to make the motion and one to second unless put forth by a committee. Whenever possible, the motion will be shown to the board via camera, scan or program.

When a motion is up for discussion:

- Speakers are limited to three minutes per speech.
- In the debate, each member has the right to speak only twice on the same question.
- Members cannot make a second speech so long as any member who has not spoken on the question desires the floor.
- Speakers shall be recognized to speak alternately for or against a pending motion.
- When speaking to a motion, the member should indicate whether he speaks in favor of the motion or in opposition.
- The presiding officer cannot cut off the debate as long as one member wishes to rise and speak.
- Any member can “move the previous question” which immediately stops debate. The motion needs a second, is not debatable and requires a 2/3rds vote to adopt.

President's Report – fall 2020

Two northwest members won major awards at the virtual 2020 AANR National Convention held August 13 and 14 in Kissimmee, FL. Karen Lahey won the coveted Jim Cossins Memorial Award which is awarded "at the discretion of the AANR President to an individual or couple, who has performed distinguished and meritorious services to AANR and who exemplifies the qualities of mature judgement, faithful dedication and high ideals and continuous services to AANR." That certainly describes the attributes which Karen possesses in abundance! She also was awarded the AANR Woman of the Year award.

Shirley Gauthier, from the Willamettans, won one of two awards presented for the Hall Of Fame Award for her years of service, leadership, expertise, and dedication for her work with the Northwest and National GAT Teams. We will not soon forget her humor and grace as she waltzed into meetings wearing a tutu, "I'm a Nudist.and I Vote" button with such enthusiasm that all in attendance had to smile!

A hearty "well done ladies" for your accomplishments and dedication to both AANR and AANR-NW throughout the years.

Regionally, despite the Covid-19 social distancing and mask wearing, most of our clubs continue to do well despite the challenges which the virus presents. Overall, this past year, NW membership only decreased by 2.46%, mostly due to the dissolution of LARC in January 2020, while the NW Associate Membership grew at a rate of a whopping 10.46% between December 2019 and June 2020. We were the ONLY region in the United States to experience a positive growth curve! Nudism is alive and well in the NW!

At the virtual 2020 General Assembly Meeting held in July, Karen Lahey won the President's Meritorious Award for her years of direction in promoting AANR, dedication to balancing AANR's budget, increasing membership and implementing the Impexium database in Kissimmee as well as the many other hats she has worn for Brand Management and Public Relations to name two.

Karen Lahey and Terri Capshaw both won awards for Member of the Year for their dedication and service.

Ken Hart and The Rogue Suncatchers won the award for the largest percentage membership growth with a 20% growth over the past year.

Bare Mountain Retreat earned the largest increase in membership numbers with nine new members joining this year.

Dave Smith was presented with the President's Gavel Award for his leadership and dedication as AANR-NW President from 2016 thru July 2020.

In closing, this year has been so completely out of the ordinary and challenging in so many ways. AANR-NW and its members have joined forces and stuck together to rise above this bump in the

road. I applaud all your hard work and perseverance in supporting your clubs and I promise we will continue to work hard to continue to improve our policy of excellence which the NW is known for.

1. All participants were introduced, each providing a brief description of their association with AANR
2. Ronna introduced Jason (Jay) Summers, a member of the Black Naturists Association since its inception in 2017, Resident Director at a private university and a diversity trainer for campus clubs and organizations who focuses on facilitating conversations on diversity and inclusion.

Recognition goes to Timothy who followed Jay on social media and connected him to Ronna.

3. Overview and discussion of diversity, inclusion and diversity training:

Jay: What is diversity training? Diversity is what we see on websites: breakdowns by gender, race, etc. But inclusion is how we collaborate, come together, share spaces. It tries to build community that benefits all members regardless of how they identify. It challenges limiting ideas and thoughts. Diversity training's goal is to open the floor for conversations to happen. Then, peel back the layers and figure out the gaps, then fill them.

Inclusion is the action, how we practice, how do we bring our lived experiences to the table and share them. The goal is to create spaces where we are all heard, valued, feel safe. It comes from conversations, because we cannot assume common sense.

One comment: Don't say "safe space," say "brave space," because everyone may not leave feeling empowered. We must be willing to be uncomfortable. Use activities to open dialogue and show us who we are.

Kathy: diversity is our differences; inclusion is how we talk about them.

Jay: Not every club is as welcoming and inclusive as we'd like them to be. This is the crux of our discussion.

Charlotte: Naturists think we're so free, but we are actually just a reflection of our society. Nudism is not the equalizer we think it is. It focuses on clothing and occupation as the things that divide us. But the concept is based on classism. Discrimination might even be worse because now I am in your space. (Cites episode of naked camping and being subjected to racial epithets and inappropriate behavior by an individual.)

Ted: there need to be measures to prevent unwanted attention, however well meaning. Applies not just for racial situations.

Ronna – re making the space safe for women. Training needed re what is appropriate to say. How do we remediate when club has treated someone disrespectfully, hurtfully, with racial undertones (plus those who overtly discriminate – e.g., no single men, but yes, single women). How do we make our clubs uphold a standard of behavior?

Evan suggests anonymous way to report incidents of all kinds with clubs. Per Erich: AANR has process under Carolyn Hawkins to register all kinds of complaints against member clubs. It's called IA, formerly chaired by Ralph Collinson. However, there are a lot of obstacles (anonymity, timeliness, retaliation) as well as flaws in the process. How do you prove that a club did these things? (They can deny it, per Karen's example.)

4. How can we as an organization support more inclusivity?

Arlette: current contract with clubs contains no penalties – there should be penalties for not following AANR standards which include inclusivity.

Jay: must have standard we can hold clubs accountable to.

Evan appreciates AANR's willingness, via representation on this call, to change. So why aren't Black Naturists in the AANR ranks and in on these conversations about how to change. We really need to start with a Black Lives Matter statement.

Jay: Cited *Why Do All the Black Kids Sit Together in the Cafeteria?* Book by Dr Beverly Tatum. Explained

it's not malice or not wanting to know others; It's about comfort. You identify with them. This kind of group is not divisive.

Timothy: As Ronna sought me out, we need to seek out people who are currently missing in leadership roles.

John: recommends AANR create a task force to address this in a serious way, using data, facilitators, etc.

Ronna: reminded group of the new committee to examine discrimination in clubs that is being headed up by Ted Peck, with one member, Tim Mullins, identified.

Jay: AANR needs to make statements that will ripple out and down, e. g., Nike example re Black Lives Matter.

5. Ronna summarized the points made at this meeting. To be truly inclusive and welcoming, these are the recommendations for AANR:

- As the leading nudist organization, be vocal and take a strong stand about our way of life and our support for social and racial justice
- Hold clubs to AANR's standards
- Document and aggregate data regarding clubs displaying or tolerating discriminatory behavior
- Embrace differences
- Have more diversity represented at the 'ruling level.'
- Actively reach out to those we want at the table
- Make young and BIPOC people feel more welcomed and involved so that they are willing to seek a higher position with AANR
- Provide training for clubs, boards and others to get to the root causes for discriminatory actions utilizing a skilled facilitator to uncover and reshape the attitudes underlying such actions.
- Be willing to institute disciplinary action upon clubs that continue to discriminate

FOREWORD:

During this meeting, a general update was given on progress made since our first feedback was submitted to the AANR PR Committee. We also discussed some recent progress and events in other areas as well as general discussion about the state of AANR today and where it can continue to improve to better serve the nudist community around the country.

We touched on the conversations around anti-discrimination policies and AANR's inability to force clubs to adopt them, but also mentioned that some regions and clubs are now looking at adopting the statement already implemented by AANR Northwest. We discussed the suggestion to increase youth leadership opportunities, which has not specifically been addressed but by coincidence has been improved by AANR regional and annual meetings operating remotely and allowing wider participation. We also discussed AANR's online presence and Charlotte's new role with AANR to assist in these areas.

NOTES:

I. DIVERSITY & INCLUSION

Demographic makeup of clubs is not reflective of the general population of the area. For example, visits to nude beaches show a very racially diverse crowd and more women and LGBTQ folks than what you see in clubs and resorts in the same area. However, if AANR tries to recruit new members at the beach, they may have trouble because the product that we are selling does not make people feel welcome. It was mentioned by Mat Trent from Florida that he has tried many times to bring his racially diverse friends to clubs but they feel unwelcome in nudist resorts and clubs when there is little diversity.

We understand that AANR may feel it does not have the right to tell clubs not to discriminate, but we agreed that a common-sense non-discrimination policy should be required for clubs in the same way that a commitment to "family values" nudism is required in order to become a chartered AANR club.

We also discussed the mixed messaging that AANR sends around diversity and inclusion. For example, AANR highlights Black members and groups like BNA during Black history month but did not embrace the Black community during recent BLM protests. This is confusing and sends a bad message to people of color and minority communities.

II. DIVERSITY STUDY & COMMITTEE

How can we improve recognition of existing diversity within the AANR membership? By doing a study to get more information about demographics, we could learn more about the makeup of our membership. It would also be wise to establish a diversity committee and/or town halls to discuss divergent issues and topics that impact various groups within our community. This would give minority AANR members an opportunity to voice their concerns and to help their community grow and improve, and would also increase awareness and

community with fellow members.

III. LEADERSHIP

Many of us have recognized growing frustration with AANR among many in the nudist community, especially by those who do not feel empowered to make change and contribute to AANR through leadership, who don't feel like leadership opportunities are available or accessible to them, or who feel that their voices and opinions are not being heard. While these are negative views of AANR, it is important to recognize that these are people who genuinely care about nudism and want to share it with the world but who are unhappy with the way that AANR represents them. More engagement with members and non-members surrounding ways that people can get involved in committees and leadership roles with AANR would help, as would more communication about voting and elections. AANR could also do more to promote participation in online regional meetings.

IV. ECONOMIC INCENTIVES

AANR may not be able to tell clubs what to do, but individual clubs might actually choose to implement new inclusion policies and practices on their own if the economic benefits are shown. Since clubs operate as independent businesses, how can these economic benefits be demonstrated in a business sense? Consider the economic impact that events like LGBTQ Pride celebrations have for cities and states that host them. Also consider the success of Pride festivals at nudist resorts. These are opportunities for our clubs to make more money and also welcome more people.

On a grander scale, we should also be considerate of the economic benefits that nude beaches have on entire regions and on nearby nudist resorts/clubs. Martin Novoa mentioned an expansive (and expensive) study done in Florida that showed nude beaches to have enormous positive impact on the local economy and clubs. The more that AANR and its affiliated clubs can support nearby nude beaches, the better. In the case of Florida, this study was used to convince the state to approve additional nude beaches and to advertise for these beaches in Florida travel guides. Can there be more communication with state travel associations to provide more information about nude beaches and clubs?

FOREWORD:

During this meeting, a general update was given on progress made since our first feedback was submitted to the AANR PR Committee. We discussed the general conversations that were taking place within AANR about adherence to a non-discrimination policy in order to obtain and maintain affiliation with AANR, in the same vein that clubs are required to maintain a family-friendly, nonsexual environment. We also discussed AANR's new ad hoc committee assembled to gather information about visitor and membership policies, including any that may be discriminatory.

We also discussed various conversations that have occurred surrounding the best ways to attract young adults, including ongoing conversations with Erich Schuttauf (Executive Director of AANR) and the AANR West website committee. In both of these cases, leadership has pushed for the inclusion of a special call-out and/or webpage on the website to appeal to young people.

The findings and opinions of the Youth & Diversity Committee on these subjects are outlined below.

NOTES:

I. YOUTH INCLUSION

On the subject of including a "young adults" focus page on the organization's website (or that of any regional website), either as a primary or sole outreach to young nudists, we are in resounding agreement that this is not only an unhelpful tactic but is detrimental to the growth of this community. A focus page notably calls attention to the lack of young people in the community. It is also uncomfortable, even when well intentioned, when a young visitor to a club is greeted with, "It's so nice to have *a young person* here," rather than "It's nice to have *you* here." This further calls attention to the lack of young adults in the community. A better approach is to bring young adults into leadership conversations, making them feel like AANR genuinely values them as an integral and vital part of this community.

Also noted: General behavior and attitudes within clubs could be improved to make *all* newcomers feel more welcome, especially young people visiting for the first time or trying to become more involved. We agree that it is important to be collaborative and kind rather than argumentative and confrontational. Nobody wants to be yelled at or made to feel like they were unwelcome when they visit a club (as has been experienced by members of this committee).

In addition, more time and energy should be spent making sure that the language and images that we use on websites and in marketing, as well as *where* we are marketing, are far more impactful in attracting younger members. We should be recruiting young people to help us attract young people, using the platforms that young people use and the content that young people like.

II. DIVERSITY & INCLUSION

We continue to stress the importance of inclusivity in our clubs. An example of blatant discrimination was provided pertaining to gay couples who are either barred entry entirely from clubs, or who are made to feel unwelcome by a stealthy misuse of “single male” policies by clubs who do not recognize same-sex relationships. We agree amongst ourselves that discriminatory policies are bad for AANR and bad for business. The nudist community and nudist resorts are already a niche market and we should discourage all policies that make it more difficult to sustain and grow membership: memberships are memberships; everyone needs to feel welcome in order for clubs to make money. We also agree that inclusive policies and practices at AANR clubs will attract more members, not cause them to flee as some might contend. It’s possible that some memberships will be lost in the process, yes, but the potential for growth far outweighs any potential losses.

We understand these kinds of changes take time. It was recommended that a five-year plan be devised to dismantle discriminatory policies and implement other methods of screening visitors and potential members. Adam brought forward the method used by his group, Just Naked, which asks applicants to include their social media account as a point of reference, an identifier that weeds out the majority of bad actors.

We understand that it is impossible and perhaps unreasonable to guarantee that everyone will always feel welcome and comfortable within our clubs. We can’t control everything that happens at all times. Also, people come to our clubs with different views, different opinions, and different political ideologies. There is, however, a great deal we can do to make those spaces more welcoming to all by listening to concerns and identifying factors that make people feel unwelcome.

Certain markers, for example, such as political flags (campaign flags, Confederate flags, BLM flags, etc.) can cause division rather than build community, especially for visitors. While freedom of speech is an important factor to consider, also worth noting is that in these spaces we shed our clothing to remove social barriers in order to better connect with one another. Thus, political and other symbolic displays might be working to undermine that goal. We did not agree on a recommendation here, but this is worth discussion.

Regarding creating a welcoming environment, it was discussed that many clubs may not even have policies or procedures to help them deal with cases of egregious behavior (such as racist, sexist, or homophobic insults or unwanted sexual advances). We should identify ways to provide clubs with these tools so that they are able to create a more welcoming space for all visitors and members. We also discussed the historical use of a “Green Book” to designate safe businesses and spaces for Black travelers during Jim Crow. Is there any potential for this type of tool within our community to designate clubs and resorts that are welcoming to people of color and/or LGBTQ visitors?

Finally, is there a way that we can more effectively put pressure on AANR to improve inclusivity policies? It was mentioned by Cyndi that most—if not all—large clubs approve of inclusivity policies and statements and that the clubs who drag their feet on these issues tend to be smaller clubs with fewer members. In this scenario, should AANR be paying more attention to the wishes of the larger clubs who drive the majority of memberships rather than the smaller clubs who hold the organization back from pursuing progress and growing this community. One example of putting pressure on clubs was given in regards to United Naturists leader (and member of the Youth & Diversity Committee) Mat Trent who requires all clubs hosting their gatherings to adhere to a standard of non-discrimination. This tactic can help to encourage clubs to improve their policies.

III. LEADERSHIP

We once again insist that more young people need to be involved in leadership discussions. This also extends to any group not currently proportionally represented in leadership roles within AANR (such as LGBTQ nudists)

and people of color). We believe that huge progress can be made by simply having a wider and more diverse array of voices participating in this community's leadership. Recruitment of young leaders is vital to the survival and growth of AANR. In order to fully realize this, however, organizational board meetings as well as club board meetings need to be made more accessible to young people who are employed and are burdened by work, family, and social obligations which may make it difficult to commit hours of time traveling to and from board meetings. Continued use of virtual meeting tools, even after the current pandemic has ended, will be an integral tool in making those meetings more accessible. Another important tool that should be widely incorporated by AANR and its affiliated clubs is an online voting system to allow easier access to voting. Currently, many clubs require in-person voting which can be difficult for younger members who do not live on the grounds of the club or are unable to take time off work to travel to the club to vote.

IV. ONLINE PRESENCE

A final point was made that many clubs and regions struggle to promote themselves effectively online, reiterating previous advice that has been shared by this committee. We need to find a way to provide appropriate tools to clubs to help them present themselves (and this community) better.

Digital Communications – AANR-NW – Fall Board Meeting 2020

- The e-news subscriber list is at 1224 valid recipients, down from 1252 last spring but up from 988 a year ago. We send out a bi-weekly mailing with a list of the events at clubs around the region for the following four weeks, along with other news items. The items in the event list also include links to the club websites. The open rate (the per cent of mailings being opened by the recipients) is running about 20-25%, down a bit from pre-pandemic, but still a very high rate in general for bulk mailings. The click rate (the per cent of readers who click on at least one link and visit some web site as a result) is running at about 3-4%; this is down a bit since there are almost no events to explore with many clubs closed or limiting big events. In every issue, we've also been including an updated report on the current status of each club (whether they're open, what events are coming), as well as we can determine from their websites and other sources.
- We continue to add events to the calendar on aanr-nw.org. Users can filter by club, by AANR-NW events, by major events and other categories.
- The cpanel that is included as part of our hosting package provides a mechanism for editing websites online.

AANR-NW PUBLIC LANDS REPORT FALL BOARD MEETING 2020

As everyone knows, this year has been a difficult one, to say the least. With the dawn of the age of Covid19, employment, travel and leisure activities were greatly affected. Both our landed and non-landed clubs have suffered, but, by mid-summer some things appeared to get back to a somewhat normalcy, albeit with masks and social distancing. Landed clubs reopened and people started heading for the beaches. The two nude beaches in Oregon still had high water in July and so beach clean-ups were going to be scheduled in late August and early September. The two August events came off okay, but on Labor Day, September 7, that all changed. The day was beautiful and warm all over the northwest, but then, a strong east wind sprang up in the afternoon. These high winds created and exacerbated fires across the northwest. Two of these fires, the Riverside and Holladay Farm fires literally threatened to destroy two of our nudist clubs, Squaw Mountain Ranch and the Willamettans. Both clubs were evacuated and the potential of destruction literally depended on the continuation of the east winds the day after Labor Day. Thankfully, they slowed down and the clubs were spared, although it was hit and miss and there is still potential danger.

Unfortunately, one of the locations in Oregon where nudity is allowed in soaking pools and the sauna, Breitenbush Hot Springs, had almost all of its rental cabins destroyed, in addition to the healing arts building, some workshops and many summer homes in a neighboring community. Due to professional and volunteer firefighting actions, the lodge and some other buildings were saved including the Breitenbush community power station, geothermal wells, water filtration plant, offices and sauna.

Due to the high incidence of fire, the air quality level hovered at hazardous to toxic for most of mid-September. The planned AANR-NW beach clean-ups were shelved until the first rains arrived this last week and the smoke began to leave and air quality eased. Finally, planning for the clean-ups was begun and they have been set and coordinated with the Rooster Rock park rangers and SOLVE. Saturday, September 26 is the annual

National Public Lands Day which would have been a good day to schedule but it is also the first of two days for our virtual regional fall board meeting.

Thus, we are doing the final nude beach trash clean-ups next Wednesday at Rooster Rock state park and Thursday at Sauvie Island Collins Nude Beach in conjunction with SOLVE. The Rooster Rock Clean-up will be Wednesday, September 30 at 10:00 a.m. and the Sauvie Island one will be Thursday, October 1 at 1:00 p.m. Both days are expected to have temperatures reaching the low to mid-80's. We welcome volunteers at either or both events. Bring bottled water, a hat, gloves and a covid19 face mask. We do have some latex and other work gloves to give out. We will provide pick-up devices and trash bags. Masks must be worn when near others not in your family group. Otherwise, both events are clothes optional when on the beach. Following the clean-ups, you may remain in the nude beach areas for the rest of the day if you desire.

Go through the park entrance and park at the far eastern portion of the parking lot near the rest rooms. The park ranger will meet us there around 10:00 a.m. A state park volunteer waiver will be needed to be signed.

We were down to the Willamettans for a few days and following a beautiful sunny day on Labor Day, the following day introduced us to the smoke, ash and darkness from the Holladay Farm fire. I intended to spend the next two days in the library, but instead, we evacuated within a few hours as the evacuation level went from zero to three (evacuate NOW!)

There was a potential threat over the next days but the club was in the end, not threatened by impending doom as the winds finally died down. The evacuation level was finally downgraded to zero and the club is now open to visitors, but the library will only open when someone is there to open it. All visitors will need to wear masks inside the building as will the librarians.

Hopefully, the donation of materials from an AANR-NW member from the Tacoma area, the transport of materials to the WNRL and the transfer of the 1950's 8mm movies to Evan Nix for digitizing will all tie together this next month as Carl Hild travels south.

We are still mounting historical plaques, framed photos and other materials on the library walls. Personal plaques for AANR or regional Hall of Fame awards especially will be graciously accepted for display. We have aggregate plaques of regional Hall of Fame and Man/Woman (now Member) of The Year going back to the creation of those awards as well as many other club and individual presentation awards. LuCinda is also working on a redesign of the setup in the main library building (on paper at this point) that we hope to accomplish this year.

Physical maintenance needed on the two buildings includes sweeping of the deck/ramp as well as regular gutter cleaning and some wood restaining/painting which needs to be done. Also, the fan on the ceiling light in the main building has not worked since last summer. I was also informed that, for some reason, the power connection to the main building is not working. I will check on that next month. The outside work can be accomplished despite the restrictions if done by a resident of The Willamettans on an individual basis.
